

Why Put it at Risk?



The Political Context: Build 1.5 Million new homes over 10 years

- Major political commitment
- Driven by strong public concern over supply and affordability issues
- Record population growth
- Achieving the housing target would require an output of units 50% greater than ever achieved in Ontario
- Major sense that comprehensive change was required





A suite of major reforms...

 The goal of achieving housing targets has led to comprehensive change in Ontario municipal governance...





Growth and Planning Policy: A totally different paradigm...

Policy
Impacts

Measures to increase pace of creation of new homes

- Municipal Pledges
- Changes to Growth Plan and PPS
- New "as of right" land uses that enable more housing
- Reducing Scope for Appeals
- Decreased focus on Heritage, Conservation Authorities...

From "you submit it and we will consider it" to "municipal pledges to achieve housing outcomes"



Recent Housing Legislation: Change to Growth Funding Tools

Financial Impacts Limits municipal revenue for growth related matters – intended to reduce costs for purchasers

- Shifts burden to property tax
- Worsens gaps in growth funding and weakens municipal financial condition.
- Initial impact on municipal finance has been estimated at >\$5B over 5 years
- But: Province has pledged to "keep municipalities whole..."



Recent Housing Legislation: Governance Change

The Upper Tier Role	 Wind up of Peel Region Still uncertainty about the other Regions Logic driven by housing, not <i>Municipal Act thinking</i>
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Review and approval of Applications	Urban Structure Planning	Construction Finance Phasing Infrastructure	Everything else Social Services, Public Health, etc.
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


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Strong Mayor Legislation: A solution to perceived lack of will...

Change in municipal democracy

- Toronto and Ottawa
- All with >100k population





More detail on Powers: Council and Committee Powers

Powers related to provincial priorities:

- Propose by-laws and pass them with 1/3 support...
- Veto a by-law which the Head of Council feels could potentially interfere. (With a 1/3 vote)
- Appoint chairs for local boards and committees.
- Establish committees and set functions
- Require council to consider a matter of provincial priority despite any procedure by-law.
- Propose and adopt a budget for the municipality, subject to amendments which Council may pass by resolution.



More Detail on Administrative Powers

The power to:

- Hire/fire CAO or any other department or division head, (exceptions for statutorily prescribed positions)
- exercise general control and management of the municipality for ensuring the efficient and effective operation; and
- reorganize the organizational structure




3. Strong Mayor: What are the main concerns?



Concerns: It won't help get more housing built...

"They won't work"



Concerns: It delivers less effective government...

- "Less effective"
- "More vulnerable to ethical lapses"

- Council-Manager Model retains collective leadership of the Council, with some roles delegated to Manager
- In the Mayor-Council Model: "With separation of powers, the Mayor can:
 - limit the professional policy advice given to the council
 - can shield staff from council oversight.
 - affect the level of professionalism that is present in the administrative organization."



Concerns: It undermines the CAO and aspects of our local government

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

Decision Making Processes

Ethics

- "Just say no:" Strong mayor powers would work best if they were held in reserve
- If you must use a 1/3 majority, pick your spots! Set out rules about how they ought to be used. The Municipal Act is not a complete code...

 Ensure that CAO can still act as "Ethics Executive": Political appointment means weakened perception of independence;

Maintaining good governance while having strong Mayor powers

Accountability for CAO

- Should maintain professionalism, objectivity and policy coordination in the municipality
- Should ensure that recruitment and performance review processes involve council and include a regular council-engaged goal setting

Neutrality and Objectivity

- Risk of compromising administrative neutrality
- More difficult to rely upon the information that council receives
- Impact council's ability to receive the best professional advice
